

Reporting Cases of Domestic Violence

Q3-1: If there is someone suffering from domestic violence or sexual assault, should we report it to the Center for Prevention of Domestic Violence and Sexual Assault? Will people seek for revenge if we report the case?

A3-1: For medical personnel, social workers, educators, childcare personnel, police, judicial personnel, village administrative personnel, or other business agents responsible for children and youth welfare, it is stipulated by law that they have to report the case in written via facsimile to the Center for Prevention of Domestic Violence and Sexual Assault within 24 hours. If you are none of the above, please do call 113, the National Women and Children Protection Hotline, or contact the Center for Prevention of Domestic Violence and Sexual Assault directly so the Center can take action to stop the violence, which can cause negative impacts on the victim physically, psychologically, and interpersonally.

As for your identity, according to the relative laws and regulations, we will keep the reporting person's identity confidential and will neither reveal your identity to a third party nor provide any information that may be used to identify you by others. Please feel safe to report the case. A child or family is saved because of your assistance!

A3-2: 1. Please do give us the address of the victim. If you cannot provide a detailed address, do help the police or social worker identify the location.

2. Please provide the following information if possible:

(1) Name, address, and age of the victim;

(2) Name, address, and contact number (including the cell phone number, home phone number, and workplace phone number) of relevant contact persons (such as the parents or guardians of the kid or the safety contact person);

(3) Any possible abusing condition or suspects for abusing others that you know;

(4) If you have reported the case already but still find new wound or abusing situation, please do report the case again.
